Governor General's History Awards**

*Canada's most prestigious history prize celebrates the achievements of history teachers,
museums, scholars, community groups, and creators of popular media*

WINNIPEG, January 20, 2026 – Canada's History Society is proud to announce the winners of the 2025 Governor General's History Awards — **the country's highest honour in the field of history**. The awards recognize excellence in a variety of history-related endeavours: teaching, museums, scholarly research, community programs, and popular media. These deserving Canadians have all contributed to a greater understanding of our past through their innovative work. The 2025 laureates will receive their awards from Her Excellency the Right Honourable Mary Simon, Governor General of Canada, at an upcoming ceremony in Ottawa.

“All of this year’s laureates share a passion for exploring largely overlooked aspects of Canada’s past and what it means for today and tomorrow. By bringing these fascinating people and thought-provoking ideas to our attention, they are helping us understand each other and our country more fully. The 2025 Laureates

The **Governor General's Award for Excellence in Teaching** honours teachers who have helped to foster a deeper understanding of the past by actively engaging students in meaningful historical projects.

The **Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Museums: History Alive!** honours museums that have made significant achievements in the presentation, preservation, and interpretation of national, regional, or local history.

- **Canadian Museum for Human Rights**, Winnipeg, Manitoba, for the exhibition *Love in a Dangerous Time*.

The **Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Scholarly Research** honours authors of the academic work published in the previous year that has made the greatest contribution to our understanding of Canada's past. One award will be presented this year for a work in French and one for a work in English.

- *Paul-Marc Sauvage (1857-1920) : journaliste engagé et intellectuel cosmopolite canadien-français*, by Hans-Jürgen Lüsebrink, associate professor at Université Laval, associate member of the Centre Canadien d'Études Allemandes et Européennes (CCEAE) at Université de Montréal and senior professor of Romance Cultural Studies and Intercultural Communication at Université de la Sarre in Saarbrücken, Germany.

The **Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Community Programming** honours innovative community-led programming that encourages interest in and enthusiasm about the past.

The **Governor General's History Award for Popular Media: The Pierre Berton Award** honours an individual who opens up Canadian history, making it accessible to a broader audience.
