4. What community features are nearby? (Examples: park, school, museum)

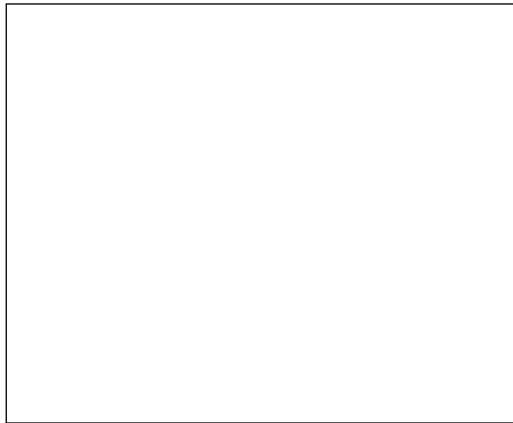
5. When was this cenotaph built?
