Canada's History Society Announces 2023 Recipients of the John Bragg Award for Atlantic Canada

Three organizations to receive a \$50,000 grant for projects that share the stories of inspiring people who have shaped Atlantic Canadian history and society.

April 11, 2023 — An immigrant photographer who championed wetlands conservation in Nova Scotia. A Jesuit priest who made it his earthly mission to support struggling farmers in P.E.I. And an Acadian architect whose vision helped to shape his community in New Brunswick.

The stories of these three innovators will be celebrated and shared thanks to the John Bragg Award for Atlantic Canada — a new granting program made possible by the River Philip Foundation that promotes and preserves the histories of community leaders in the region.

"So much of Canada's history is stewarded at the local level by passionate and dedicated community members," said Joanna Dawson, Director of Programs at Canada's National History Society. "The John Bragg Award is a generous initiative that will make a significant impact in ensuring that these important histories are remembered for generations to come."

"We are pleased that this award will support communities in Atlantic Canada and contribute to innovative projects that conserve and promote the stories of inspiring leaders in the region," said John Bragg on behalf of the River Philip Foundation. "By recognizing and honouring the contributions of these history makers, we can inspire future generations to continue to make a positive impact in their communities."

The 2023 recipients are:

- Father Belcourt: Missionary, Educator, Visionary, Fighter for Human Rights, Friends
 of the Farmers Bank of Rustico Inc., Rustico, Prince Edward Island
- Nazaire Dugas, Nordais Collectif, Tracadie, New Brunswick

Each organization will receive a \$50,000 contribution to carry out their initiative. In addition, they will be featured in a content piece developed by Canada's History to help further share these stories with a national audience.

Each of the recipient projects aim to expand knowledge and increase public awareness of key leaders in their communities through activities that include the construction of an outdoor classroom, designing a travelling exhibit, and developing a provincial education kit.
